COLORADO POLICY PATHWAYS



At American Whitewater, we know that water policy is a key ingredient in driving smart solutions for the future of the state. Our new report, *Colorado Policy Pathways*, outlines policy solutions to address the changes and challenges that Colorado's rivers face as our population grows, the outdoor economy booms, and the urban/rural divide persists, and details our core principles and our approach to the 2020 Colorado Legislative Session and beyond.

CORE PRINCIPLES

While no one-size policy fits all communities in a state as varied as Colorado, river stewardship is the key to the state's sustainable future. Wise water policy can address many dimensions of the change-drivers noted above, and we see many opportunities to **drive economic development in a community-based, equitable, and impactful way.**

With its booming cities, the Front Range powers much of Colorado's economy. However, millions of people spend their dollars in the rural regions of the mountains and the Western Slope. These rural communities rely on local rivers and creeks to drive their economies, and American Whitewater supports policies to:

help keep these rivers healthy;

- provide additional support to develop smart growth of the recreation economy that enriches and promotes the culture of rural Colorado, and
- Enable community-backed, community-led growth.

We also urge lawmakers to join us in our commitment to **strengthen Colorado's built infrastructure** in order to ensure safe access to recreation areas. Following a pattern seen nationally, Colorado roads and bridges are in urgent need of repair, upgrade, and investment.

Overcrowding and access will become even larger issues as growth continues. In the 2019 Statewide Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan, the State of Colorado acknowledges that two of the top three barriers to outdoor recreation

are overcrowding and congestion, and that we need long-term planning and maintenance of existing infrastructure to overcome this hurdle. driven economic development plans, public health benefits, and prioritize community wellness and quality of life, today, and for future generations.

POLICY DIRECTIONS

We strongly believe that all Colorado water policy should be based on the broadest possible representation of interests. As a bi-partisan organization, we find common cause with individuals, organizations, companies, elected officials, and communities that share our love of rivers, and see five distinct sets of opportunities for smart policymaking at the state level:

- Preserving and enhancing instream flow protections which support both environmental and human health and are essential to healthy rivers
- Restoring Colorado's rivers to a more natural state, including urban river restoration projects, to address impacts from water development, mining, and other human impacts that have degraded our rivers and river communities
- Modernizing, expanding and implementing improved water supply forecasting systems
- Protecting and enhancing

• Supporting Wild and Scenic Designations and management plans
