RE: Boating Policy on the Mongaup River below Rio Reservoir

Dear Mr. Rudge,

As the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (NYS DEC) continues its internal review of the Unit Management Plan for the Mongaup Valley Wildlife Management Area, the Upper Delaware Council (UDC) recommends that boating be restricted on the Mongaup River below the Rio Reservoir to just the present special weekend releases for kayakers specified in the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) license for the reservoir.

This section of the Mongaup River is a beautiful, pristine area which is one of the prime bald eagle habitats in the eastern United States. It also serves as an important wild trout "hatchery" for the Upper Delaware Scenic and Recreational River. Rio Reservoir was built in the 1920s. Orange and Rockland Utilities only opened the area to fishing in the 1950s and boating was never allowed until the FERC license was issued in 1992. At that time the UDC, local municipalities, and various emergency response organizations were opposed to special two-turbine releases for boating because of safety reasons, not only because of the difficult terrain in the valley for rescues, but concern about the wave created entering the Delaware River. We continue to hear complaints by anglers that boating interferes with their fishing experience. The FERC-required "Recreational Usage Reports," which were prepared up until 2002, largely ignored those conflicts in favor of the boaters.

We are concerned that the Mongaup River will become just another "water park ride" seven days a week if boating is not restricted. We fear that more use will necessitate the need for more facilities, including access roads, which could degrade this unique area. The natural resources and wild nature of the area must be protected.

The UDC hopes that you will seriously take this recommendation under advisement and that the Unit Management Plan will be completed in the near future.
